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Bandicoots & Banksia scrub: You can play a role in conserving them

As reported in our January newsletter, we have recently received a grant to assist us in re-creating habitat for the endangered population of Longnosed bandicoots at North Head.

The project, funded by the Australian Government's Community Action Grants program, runs from January 2011 through to June 2012. During this time, we'll be working closely with Dr Nelika Hughes from Australian Wildlife Conservancy and with the Trust, to design bandicoot habitat patches in places where they provide safe connections between feeding and nesting areas. The plants we use will be local native species grown by our Nursery volunteers and will mostly be species that make up the endangered Eastern Suburbs Banksia Scrub ecological community. We'll be tracking how the bandicoots use different patches of planting, to help us better understand what makes a good bushland home for them.

The grant funding requires us to get members of the community involved.

There are several ways in which you can help. For example, we need people to:

- volunteer to help with night-time spotlight observation and counting of the 'coots using different patches

- get involved in our education program and help raise community awareness of the endangered species, populations and habitats on North Head and what we can all do to help conserve them

- be part of an Earthwatch 'Bandicoots on the Brink' one day or weekend event at North Head. Volunteers will be needed from time-to-time starting in late April or May.

A Brave Nurse (from Queanbeyan Age and Queanbeyan Observer Friday 13 December 1918).

"Nursing Sister Elizabeth McGregor who died at the Quarantine Station of pneumonic influenza on Thursday, left for France with the first Australian Volunteer Hospital in August 1914. She was at Rouen when the hospital was forced to evacuate and retire to St. Nazarie. Thence Sister McGregor went to the first Hospital at Wimmereux, which she left, in 1916, and transferred to Corfu, where she undertook Red Cross nursing. Salonica was the next destination, where she developed malaria and dysentery. After her arrival in London Sister McGregor underwent a most serious operation, which necessitated her return to Australia. For the past three months Sister McGregor had been on duty at Randwick Military Hospital, where her name was one of the first to be put up for nursing at the Quarantine Station."

Looking back

Sydney Morning Herald, Friday 29 March 1935 BATTERY OF GUNS for North Head

"An immediate commencement is to be made with the fortification of North Head for the defence of Sydney Harbour. Guns (9.2-inch) are to be erected in a battery which will occupy a commanding position on the headland, from which they can be used if necessary to attack enemy ships approaching the harbour or ships already within the port. A portion of the Parkhill Reserve at Manly, which was opened to the public some time ago, will be resumed and closed to the public after the battery has been constructed.

The guns to be installed at North Head are being made in England, and will, it is expected, arrive In Australia before the end of this year.

The Commonwealth Government has accepted a tender for the construction and completion of the battery and adjoining structures at North Head, at a cost of £43,718. The successful tenderers are the McConnell Building Company Ltd. of Sydney. The date for completion of the work is January 17 1938."
