General Meeting - Orchids

Our next General Meeting will be held at 2pm on Saturday 17 June 2023 at Bandicoot Heaven (Building 20). Our guest speaker will be Wendy Grimm BSc, MPhil from Australian Plants Society, North Shore Group. Her talk: "A beginners guide to local orchids" will cover many northern Sydney orchid species in the general order in which they flower through the year.

Bandicoot Heaven – getting to know North Head's environment

When overseas visitors (especially people from the UK) come to our Education Room, Bandicoot Heaven, an early question from many of them is about what spiders we have at North Head. It is always good to be able to show them our spider sheet and explain that the most common spiders in the bush at North Head are the Golden (or Garden) Orb Weaver and during some seasons, the St Andrew's Cross.



The Garden Orb Weaver (*Eriophora biapicata* or *Eriophora transmarina*) builds a fine wheel-shaped web between trees or shrubs (often across the walking tracks), in which it catches its prey – various flying insects. The Orb Weaver is an important food source for birds, including Honeyeaters. The St Andrews Cross spider (Argiope keyserlingi) builds a



erlingi) builds a distinctive web with strong strands in a X-shape. The spider rests in wait for its insect prey with 2 legs on each of these strong

strands, and with its distinct yellow marks across its body, it is easily recognised.

Other more dangerous spiders, including the grounddwelling Funnel-web and the Red-back undoubtedly occur at North Head, but are only rarely seen (except as a large soft toy in Bandicoot Heaven).

Spiders are a vital part of Sydney's ecosystems. Along with the more than 3500 other spider species found in Australia, the North Head spiders are contributing to pest insect control and providing food for birds, lizards and some small mammals.

Remembering Rory Lynsky

Jenny Wilson Argus (Melbourne, Vic. : 1848 - 1957), Friday 18 May 1900 THE SYDNEY OUTBREAK.

TWO MORE CASES AND TWO DEATHS.

SYDNEY. Thursday.

"Henry McDonough, of St. Peter's, whose attack by plague was reported last night, died this morning before he could be removed to quarantine.

David Fatzeus, who was guarantined from the Glebe last week, also died this morning.

Mrs. Donnelly, aged 49, residing at Kensington-street, city, was found to be suffering from plague this morning, and a Chinese named Ah Hern was left by his countrymen at the Mission-hall in Castlereagh-street when attacked by the disease.

Seven hundred and seventy-two rats were burnt to-day, and 254 persons were inoculated at the Town-hall. Several buildings in the Glebe area which has been isolated have been found to be unfit for habitation and ordered to be destroyed."

North Queensland Register (Townsville, Qld.: 1892 -1905), Monday 21 May 1900, SYDNEY, May 18.

"Mary Read, aged 35, living in Searles Dane, City, was taken to the Quarantine Station this morning suffering from plaque, -

Bernard Sullivan, aged 20, died at his residence, Little Essex Street, City, to-day. A postmortem examination revealed that plague was the cause of death. Edward M. Swadgan, aged 46, residing at the corner of Vane and Abercrombie Streets, Redfern, developed plague to-night. The Chinaman. Ah Hern, who developed the plaque yesterday, died this morning before he could be removed to the Hospital."
